DUPAK DoE PAK POPPENSPE(E)LMUSEUM NEWSLETTER AND SCRIBBLINGS NUMBER 24d DoE PAK DUPAK

Een **dupák** (sprek uit: **doepak**) is een stang- en trucpop. Het nummer met de dupák wordt in het Tsjechische en Slowaakse volkspoppentheater met marionetten en stangpoppen altijd als toegift opgevoerd. De pop maakt sprongen waarbij zijn lijf buertelings lang en kort wordt. Het is een truc die overeenkomt met het uittrekken en weer inkringen van de hals van de *Dood van Pierlala* in de poppenkast. Pierlala is een stokpop en wordt van onderaf gemanipuleerd; de dupák wordt als stangpop van bovenaf bewogen. Terwijl het rijzen van Pierlala's hals heel langzaam en onder doode stilte geschiedt, gaat het strekken en inkringen van de dupák razendsnel en met veel rumoer. Dupák betekent 'stampend'. De houten voeten zijn met lood verwaard. Het lijf van de pop is een zak van stof. De stang waaraan de dupák hangt, gaat door de kop en het lijf heen en zit vast aan de houten heup. Het ligt in de kop is iets wijder dan de dikte van de stang, waardoor de kop soepel op en neer gaat. Aan weerszijden van de kop van de dupák is een touw vastgemaakt. De touwtjes gaan omhoog en zijn bevestigd aan een speelhoutje. Door dit houtje op en neer te bewegen, rekkt en krimpt het lappen lijf. De pop gaat als het ware door de knieën en veert weer op. Behalve springen kan de dupák ook om zijn armen wijd uit.

Dutch Puppetry Museum

The Puppetry Museum presents the tradition of folk and mainstream puppet theatre and contemporary forms of puppet and figure theatre. The museum collection comprises wayang figures, marionettes, hand puppets, rod puppets, rod marionettes and Jumping Jacks, shadow puppet theatre, paper theatres, photographs, prints, posters, bric-a-brac, paraphernalia, and audiovisual material. Its library contains over seven thousand titles: rare and valuable books, reference books, literature, manuscripts, and scripts. Its collection, and other material can be used for research and educational purposes and are, of course, also available to the general public.

Online collection

The museum has a vast collection of literature on puppet theatre and related arts and many richly illustrated publications are still added to it. Nearly all Dutch and multi-language articles about puppet theatre are also available in PDF format on www.poppenspelmuseumbibliotheek.nl. ▷ DIY. The correct answers are: théâtre, Pierrot (figure in white) and Polichinelle. Polichinelle was not only a comical character on stage – usually accompanied by Pierrot – but also the main character of French puppet theatre. During the nineteenth century he was pushed aside by the much more plain Guignol. Polichinelle made his comeback in Parisian folk puppet theatre during the last decade of the twentieth century.
